SCCS honors alumnus Kent Taber as 2025 Wall of Distinction inductee

Sandy Creek Central School District proudly announces Kent Taber, class of 1966, as the 2025 inductee to the SCCS Wall of Distinction. The prestigious recognition honors graduates who have demonstrated a high level of professionalism, distinction and moral character, serving as exemplary role models to current and future students.



Throughout his life, Taber has embodied these values through a lifetime of service and dedication to others. A Vietnam War veteran, Taber served in the U.S. Army as a communication specialist. Upon returning to Sandy Creek in 1972, he began a long career with the district as a custodian, bus mechanic and eventually head mechanic. He held this position until his retirement in 2002, always prioritizing the safety of both students and staff.

After retirement, Taber volunteered with the Angels on Earth project, supporting Oswego County residents in need. Since 2013, he has also served as a driver and volunteer for PEACE Inc., assisting low-income families across Onondaga and Oswego counties. In addition, he has been an active volunteer at the Mad River Club, contributing to programs such as hunter safety and DEC education.

He was nominated for this honor by Linda Taber, Eric Taber, James Ridgeway and Rollin Mincher. The official induction ceremony was held June 27 in the District Office Board Room, and was well-attended by family, friends, and members of the SCCS community. Speakers included Superintendent Kevin Seymour, Linda Taber and Rollin Mincher.

During the ceremony, Mincher, who works alongside of Taber at PEACE Inc., shared why he felt compelled to nominate him. "This man helps many families by serving as a conduit in getting donations to those who need it most," he said. "He is a humanitarian who quietly works behind the scenes changing people's lives for the better."

The SCCS Wall of Distinction program was established to honor alumni who fit the following criteria: demonstrating a high level of professionalism and distinction and exemplifying moral character and acting as a positive role model.

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Sandy Creek Central School District receives national recognition for SEL Campaign

Sandy Creek Central School District has been honored with the National School Public Relations Association (NSPRA) Excellence Award for Marketing Materials for its "Be Good Comets" Social Emotional Learning (SEL) Campaign.

The campaign was recognized as part of NSPRA's Publication and Digital Media Awards, which highlight outstanding tactical communications including newsletters, print materials, videos, podcasts, websites and social media. Entries are judged based on excellence, creativity and impact.

This year's winners represent the best in school communication across the country, and Sandy Creek Elementary's campaign stood out among 120 entries for its design and effective approach to student recognition and school culture.



The SEL Committee launched the Be Good Comets initiative to recognize and encourage positive student behavior. To bring their vision to life, they partnered with the CiTi BOCES Public Relations team to develop a visually dynamic campaign designed to educate and inspire the students.

The CiTi team organized a photoshoot featuring volunteer students and the district mascot to capture everyday acts of kindness, such as opening doors or helping a friend in need. These images were transformed into colorful posters highlighting the core traits of being a "Good Comet," which now hang throughout the school. The team also created eye-catching social media graphics to showcase the weekly Comet call-out winners, celebrating students who go above and beyond.

School psychologist and SEL Committee member, Whitney Oak, explained how the school put the campaign into action. "Each week, staff members passed out tickets to students who demonstrated kindness, resilience and positive decision-making," she said. "On Fridays, five student names were drawn from a pool of 300- 400 recognition tickets, and those students received a prize, a certificate, and had their photos shared on the school's bulletin board and digital platforms."

Members of the SEL committee and CiTi PR team were recognized during a SCCS Board of Education meeting on July 10 for their outstanding role in creating this campaign, along with a second Award of Excellence for the district's quarterly newsletter.
