## **IVISON'S INSIGHTS**

As I sit here on election night it appears that the United States will have a record turnout for this election. Several things come to my mind;

- ♦ Who won?
- ♦ Even though it may be a record turnout the percentage of eligible voters will still probably be extremely poor.

My heart goes out to all the Veterans who served our country and protected our ability to vote freely.

I hope that every adult reading this newsletter exercised their right to vote. If not please take part in future elections.

In looking at the calendar, I dare say November is probably our most important month of the year. Besides Election Day:

- ♦ Tuesday, November 11 is Veterans day,
- Wednesday November 12 is the capital project vote for BOCES,
- ♦ We have Thanksgiving rounding out the end of the month.

In addition there are less significant events, for example:

- ♦ I think many of us were looking forward to an extra hour of sleep when daylight savings time ended
- Opening day of deer season for the southern zone
- ♦ There are a few masticates looking forward to Black Friday.

This makes me realize that I need to stop and take time to reflect on the things we are grateful for during this Holiday season. We need to appreciate the sacrifices our veterans have made, we need to be thankful for our family, and we just need to understand that not everyone in the world has the same abilities that we take for granted in the United States.

It's starting to be a busy month and winter for the District and the Board of Education (BOE). We are holding a joint BOE meeting with the Pulaski BOE. There are several purposes of the meeting, i.e. meet and greet, share positive, creative, and successful ideas or approaches that the Districts have completed, and brain storm ideas for continuing and expanding our efforts to shared items, positions, and services.

In addition to local issues, as you have heard the state of the state is not well due to the national fiscal crisis. We are anticipating that education will share in the budget cuts proposed by Governor Patterson. Thankfully the Administration has positioned SCCS to be able to weather the forecasted budget storm. We still remain concerned that Albany will once again shift spending to the local tax payers via additional unfunded mandates, or will develop state aid formulas to benefit down state districts (penalizing upstate rural districts), or by failing to trim excessive spending requirements. For this reason a "Tax Cap" alone will not work. If our State government leadership can demonstrate leadership and fiscal control then a tax cap could work and would be supported.

I would like to personally thank, on behalf of the SCCS BOE, John Shelmidine for representing us on the BOCES Board of Education. If you were not aware, John has served as the BOCES BOE President for the past few years. I could not imagine any of our existing SCCS BOE members or myself taking on this extra duty and providing the dedication that John has provided. I also want to take this opportunity to mention the BOCES capital project vote on November 12th. I suspect the results of the vote will be readily known by the time you read this. The BOCES renovation project is long overdue as they have several unusable buildings due to mold and structural problems created by heavy snow loads. Our BOCES students deserve a better facility. One of the reasons that the capital project is so large probably can be attributed to the lack of reinvestment in facilities due to tight school budgets in the past and the inability of some or many districts to be able to afford the increased debt service. This is still a valid concern of SCCS BOE and many other districts.

I wish you and your families the best in this Holiday Season.



## English Language Arts Rising Stars After School Program


Using 2008-2009 Title I funds, the Sandy Creek Central School District was able to expand the Rising Stars after school English Language Arts (ELA) Program. The Rising Stars ELA program started in the middle of October and will end at the beginning of January. Students at grades 3-6 are currently working with teachers to prepare for the ELA New York State assessments that will be administered during January 2009. As part of the program expansion, select students in Grades 1 and 2 were invited to attend after school sessions to target identified reading skills. With the addition of this early reading instruction, students will have more opportunities to reach proficiency on future state tests.


sang our National Anthem and led the group in singing the Alma Mater. Mrs. Crast and members of NHS look forward to working with the school and community to provide service to those in need.

## News from the High School

On-Line Courses will be offered at Sandy Creek High School shortly. NovaNET offers high school credit recovery courses which are designed for students who have already taken a course for a year, failed it, and are repeating the course. This option will allow students the opportunity to retake an entire course in a shorter period of time. Students will be granted high school credit if they complete the pre-determined course work and pass the required benchmark exams. All course work will be monitored by staff members. recovery courses that we will offer will be in Regents English, science and social studies for 9-12 grade levels. NovaNET also offers ACT and SAT practice tests for any junior or senior attending our school.

## **Staying Connected**

The Sandy Creek School District is helping parents stay connected to their children's school by using three important web-based programs. These programs can help parents stay current with grades, class assignments, school closings and food purchases/lunch balances (new this year).

Teacherweb is a website controlled directly by the teachers at SCCS. On this site a teacher can post classroom assignments, homework and also student's grades (password protected). To access a particular classroom, go to the Sandy Creek Website www.sccs.cnyric.org, click on the staff directory link and then click the word LINK under website. This will take you to the teacher's webpage. You can browse the site and e-mail the teacher to obtain a username and password to obtain your child's grades. Posting grades is optional for the teachers and not all teachers have grades posted to the website.

Connect-Ed is the program we utilize for mass communication via phone and e-mail to notify parents about school cancellations, emergencies and important messages. The district is also considering using this service for extracurricular activities (athletics, music, etc...). This would allow coaches and supervisors to send calls to parents alerting them to sudden cancellations or changes to extracurricular events which their children are participating in.

The Food Service department at SCCS uses a program called WINSNAP to track food purchases and account balances for all students. We are in the process of creating a web accessible portal for parents to view their student's food purchases and also their account balances. Parents may also use this site to place money into their child's account (optional). More information will be distributed to district residents as this service becomes available.

#### News From The School Based Health Center

Flu season is right around the corner. We'd like to take the opportunity to remind everyone about influenza or "flu" and the best ways to prevent getting it.

Influenza is a very contagious virus that causes illness. Symptoms of influenza include high fever, headache, severe fatigue, sudden onset of cough, sore throat, runny nose, and sore muscles.


The best way to prevent influenza is to get a flu shot. Flu shots are recommended for all children age 6 months and older. Flu shots will be available at the school based health center. Other ways to prevent flu are to avoid close contact with someone who is sick, stay home when you are sick, cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing, and most importantly wash your hands frequently.

If you should develop symptoms of the flu, see your health care provider right away. A swab of your nasal passages can tell us if you do have influenza, and you can start medicine that will minimize the symptoms of your illness.
