School District Faces Budget Challenge and Declining Enrollment

This year's budget development process will be very challenging to say the least.

The Governor is trying to close a projected \$13.7 billion dollar gap with cuts, consolidations and an array of new and increased fees, surcharges and taxes. The Governor is proposing a cut in state aid to education by 700 million dollars compared to last year. For Sandy Creek, this means a 3.3% decrease in state aid which amounts to \$345,000. He also is proposing the elimination of the Middle-Class Star Rebate Program which helps homeowners defray the costs of school taxes.

The School District is also facing a decline in student enrollment. The Board of Education had a Cohort Enrollment Analysis done this fall and it indicated that we could experience a decline of 150 students over the next five years.

Each year the Board sets Budget Goals before the Budget Process begins. I would like to share those with you:

- •The Board of Education will seek input from the Administrators, Department Coordinators, and the Community Liaison Committee.
- •The Board of Education will keep the District's Educational Goals at the forefront when developing the budget.
- •Staffing will be determined by student need and enrollment.
- The Board of Education will examine existing resources and reallocate when necessary.
- •The Board of Education will examine reserve funds and discuss options for utilization if necessary.
- •The Board of Education will target a 0% Tax Levy increase.
- $\bullet\mbox{The Board}$ of Education will target a 0% increase in the 09-10 Expenditure Plan.
- •The Board of Education will develop a 5 Year Financial Plan.

The Board of Education will consider the recommendations of the NYS Commission on Property Tax Relief.

IVISON'S INSIGHTS





I would like to remind everyone that the above items are goals and in the end we may not be able to meet every item. Again if you are interested in participating in the budget liaison committee please contact the district office or a Board of Education member if you have questions. We will be having budget updates at each Board of Education meeting and work session, which are the 2nd and 4th Thursdays and are open to the public.

PRE K REGISTRATION AT SANDY CREEK CENTRAL SCHOOL

Sandy Creek Central School will hold Pre-K registration for the 2009-2010 class on Wednesday, March 25, 2009 from 12:30 to 2:00 p.m. and from 6:00 to 7:30 p.m. at the Sandy Creek Elementary Lobby

Please understand that this is the first step in the application process. Space is limited, and you must have <u>completed</u> information returned by **the end of the day March 25**th to move ahead in this process. It is important to fill out all the information, especially the transportation form. This information is needed to determine the A. M. and P. M. classes and the timing for the bus routes.

We have two classes of Pre-K that both have AM and PM slots, so we are able to enroll up to 52 students in the program. If more than 52 students are signed up on March 25^{th} , students will be picked from a lottery. If <u>less</u> than 52 students are signed up on March 25^{th} , they will all be included at that time.

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KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION AT SANDY CREEK CENTRAL SCHOOL

Sandy Creek Central will hold Kindergarten registration for the 2009—2010 class on Wednesday, March 25, 2009. A child must be 5 years old on or before December 1, 2009 and must be a resident of the Sandy Creek Central School District to be eligible to enter Kindergarten in September.

Registration hours are as follows:

12:30 -- 2:00 P. M.at the Sandy Creek Elementary6:00 - 7:30 P. M.School, in the Elementary Lobby.You may come in to register at the time convenient for you.

Your child does not need to attend registration with you. There will be visitation and testing dates for the incoming Kindergartners later in the spring.

Please bring your youngsters' birth certificate and immunization records to registration. Also, be ready to sign up for a testing date in May. If you are unable to join us on March 25, you may call the elementary office to make other arrangements [387-3445 Ext. 1110].

Questions about immunization requirements may be directed to the school nurse.

If you are new to the area and/or feel we may not have your child on our census list, please call the elementary office <u>now</u> [387-5626 Ext. 1110]. It is important that we have an accurate projection of kindergarten size for staffing and facility planning. Also, there are materials we would like to send you.

Financial Aid for College Students

The 2009-10 FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) is now available for students who will be attending college. Students and their families are encouraged to complete the FAFSA as soon as possible so that they meet not only the federal deadline for student aid, but also state and institutional deadlines. The FAFSA determines your students' eligibility for most federal and state grant awards, work-study programs, institutional aid, and low-cost federal student loans.

The FAFSA is available online at <u>www.fafsa.ed.gov</u>. If students/parents do not have computer access, they can request a paper FAFSA by calling 1-800-433-3243. Remember, the early bird gets the worm, so don't delay!

Character Education — Update from the High School

In August a group of SCCS students met to identify the key topics they wanted to address during the school year. A separate meeting was held with a volunteer group of staff members to assist students in coming up with activities/events that would address their issues. The three main topics students wanted to address were <u>drugs and alcohol</u>, <u>bullying</u>, and <u>building positive relationships</u>.

This past September, the staff and students underwent a ten hour leadership training designed to bring the group together as a cohesive unit and to help build the leadership skills within the student group. Students and staff have participated in a number of activities since then. The next activity is to host a forum for parents in February. A letter will be going out to parents in this community regarding a Drug and Alcohol Forum where panelist from county agencies will disclose what our children are being exposed to and what are the latest trends regarding drug and alcohol use. The tentative date is February 11, 2009. Please watch for that letter.

The leadership students will also be hosting an assembly for the middle school students sometime this Spring addressing the three main topics. We are hoping the assembly will spark interest for middle school students to join forces with the leadership group to add programs that trickle down to the elementary level next year.

Technology in Our School

I would like to share with you some of the technology changes that are taking place in the Sandy Creek School District. We strive to provide a quality educational experience for our students and technology integration is both required and necessary for their future success.

Remote Access: We have initiated a new method of remote entry for our students and staff to gain access to their home directory files stored on our servers. We previously used Citrix for remote access but some students had trouble downloading the programs required for this server environment. We have now switched to remote desktop which allows for up to 20 remote users at one time. To access this remote entry you need to visit the SCCS home page at <u>www.sccs.cnyric.org</u> and go to the technology link from the left hand menu. On the technology page click on the remote access link and remote desktop will automatically launch. You will need a valid SCCS log-in to access your home directory files.

Going Green and saving Money: During these tough economic times we are always reminded of the costs involved in technology purchases and use. One method of cost saving we have been pursuing over the last two years is the gradual phase-out of CRT monitors on our computers and replacing them with LCD monitors. LCD monitors use roughly 1/3 as much energy as a CRT and have a much lower heat output. All of our computers are also programmed to automatically shut down after a specified period of inactivity to help lower energy costs.

Software and subscription programs are also a significant cost to the district. We use bulk purchases through the various BOCES to obtain many of our software programs at discounted rates. Some of our licenses are available as "concurrent

user" purchases meaning that we only purchase the number of licenses that we think will be used at any given time. This helps reduce the cost significantly yet the programs are still available on all district computers.

Distance Learning: The Distance Learning Room at SCCS is one of the most highly advanced DL centers in upstate New York. Fully equipped to send and receive high quality interactive digital audio and video signals to any similar location in the world it provides our students with some outstanding opportunities. Currently the room is used to provide distance learning classes to some of our students in subjects that are not available at SCCS. It also allows us to provide virtual field trips to locations all over the world where our students can see and interact with teachers, students and professionals at locations that would be virtually impossible to visit physically.



Dear Parent, Guardian, and School Staff:

New York State Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year. The following pesticide applications took place in the Sandy Creek Central School from September 1,2008 to February 6, 2009:

There have been no pesticide applications during the above stated period.

As a reminder, the Sandy Creek Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application;
- Anti-microbial products;
- Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Nonvolatile insecticidal baits in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- The application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25;

• The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps, and hornets.

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.





STAR Program May Lower Property Taxes: Have you filed your application?

Lower school taxes result from the homeowners who participate in the state's School Tax Relief (STAR) Program. STAR provides primary residence homeowners with a reduced assessment.

There are two STAR programs, as follows:

BASIC:

All eligible homeowners

Exempts first \$32,000 approximately [08-09 ranges of \$27,370 - \$42,440 specific by town] (full value) of assessment for school tax purposes

ENHANCED:

For homeowners 65+ years of age

2007 Income for STAR purposes less than \$73,000

Exempts first \$60,000 approximately [08-09 ranges of \$51,820 - \$80,350 specific by

town] (full value) of assessment for school tax purposes

Must be renewed annually by MARCH 1ST

Cannot be combined with Basic STAR

Q. How do I get my Basic STAR tax cut?

A. You must file an application with your town assessor. The application has been made as simple as possible. Property owners who are granted the Basic STAR exemption generally will not need to reapply in subsequent years because the Basic STAR exemption is granted regardless of income. However, Basic STAR recipients will need to notify their assessor if their primary residence changes.

Q. Where do I get the STAR application?

A. Star applications are available from your town assessor, your county real property tax office, or on the internet.: <u>http://www.orps.state.ny.us/ref/forms/pdf/rp425.pdf</u>. The Enhanced/Renewal Form: <u>http://www.orps.state.ny.us/ref/forms/pdf/rp425rnw.pdf</u>.

Q. Is there a deadline by which I must file the application form?

A. Yes. The deadline for applications is March 1st.

Q. Where do I file the STAR application form?

A. With your town assessor. The application is processed locally, not by the State. Do not file the application with the State Office of Real Property Services, the Governor's Office, your school district, or any other State agency.


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Circle Free ½ Celebration
