Oswego County BOCES Proposes A \$35.4 Million Renovation Project

Stewart R. Amell Superintendent of Schools The Oswego County BOCES Board of Education is proposing a \$35.4 million dollar renovation project vote for February 28th. The first \$20 million dollars of the project will focus on health and safety concerns which

include replacing the electrical and mechanical systems that are out-dated and desperately in need of upgrading. The plumbing and drainage systems will also be addressed.

The remaining \$15.4 million dollars will be used to improve program space such as classrooms and labs thus allowing the training center flexible space for future program needs. Added security measures, improvement in vehicular and pedestrian traffic patterns will also be addressed. The additional dollars will also be used to include green initiatives and technologies.

The nine county school districts, including SCCS, will be able to finance the project over 20 years with minimal impact to the taxpayers. Please see the estimated annual fiscal impact for each district resident in the table below.

STAR Program May Lower Property Taxes: Have you filed your application?

Lower school taxes result from the homeowners who participate in the state's School Tax Relief (STAR) Program. STAR provides primary residence homeowners with a reduced assessment.

There are two STAR programs, as follows:

BASIC:

- * All eligible homeowners
- * Exempts first \$30,000 approximately [10-11 ranges of \$25,500 \$33,620 specific by town] (full value) of assessment for school tax purposes

Note: Do <u>not</u> have to renew this annually

ENHANCED:

- * For homeowners 65+ years of age
- * 2011 Enhanced Exemption based on 2009 Income for STAR purposes less than \$79,050
- * Exempts first \$60,000 approximately [10-11 ranges of \$51,090 \$63,640 specific by town] (full value) of assessment for school tax purposes
- * Must Be Renewed Annually by MARCH 1ST
- * Cannot be combined with Basic STAR

Q. How do I get my Basic STAR tax cut?

A. You must file an application with your town assessor. The application has been made as simple as possible. Property owners who are granted the Basic STAR exemption generally will not need to reapply in subsequent years because the Basic STAR exemption is granted regardless of income. However, Basic STAR recipients will need to notify their assessor if their primary residence changes.

Q. Where do I get the STAR application?

A. Star applications are available from your town assessor, your county real property tax office, or on the internet.: <u>http://www.orps.state.ny.us/ref/forms/pdf/rp425.pdf</u>. The Enhanced/Renewal Form: <u>http://www.orps.state.ny.us/ref/forms/pdf/rp425rnw.pdf</u>.

Q. Is there a deadline by which I must file the application form?

A. <u>Yes.</u> The deadline for applications is March 1st.

Q. Where do I file the STAR application form?

A. With your town assessor. The application is processed locally, not by the State. Do not file the application with the State Office of Real Property Services, the Governor's Office, your school district, or any other State agency.

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2011 Title I Rising Stars Early Reading and NYS Testing After School Programs

Thanks to Title I grant funds and transportation provided by the district, the Sandy Creek elementary/middle school was able to offer another year of the Rising Stars after school programs. The Rising Stars programs offer extended day opportunities for recommended students at grades 1-6 to receive additional instruction and support. The programs started on January 4th and operate on Tuesdays and Thursdays through the end of April.



The Rising Stars Early Reading program targets students at grades one and two. Students who need additional instruction and practice with basic early literacy skills were invited to attend this program. The program is fully functional this year with almost twenty students attending on a regular basis. During this additional time, teachers work with children in small groups. Small group instruction includes skill work in the areas of phonics, vocabulary, fluency, and comprehension.

The Rising Stars English Language Arts and Math Test Preparation program is offered at grades 3-6. Students who were identified as needing help with test taking, reading, and/or math skills were invited to attend in preparation for the upcoming NYS May 2011 ELA and Math assessments. Over 50 students are attending this program on a regular basis, receiving small group instruction in the key areas that will help the children be successful on NYS exams.

These programs offer fulfilling opportunities for many of our students to receive instruction that targets individual needs. Additionally, all of the Rising Stars instructors are NYS certified teachers who are employed by the district. With this expert knowledge, these instructors are making a difference for these Rising Stars students.

PRE K AND KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION AT SANDY CREEK CENTRAL SCHOOL

Sandy Creek Elementary will be conducting registration for the PreK and Kindergarten classes of 2011 on Wednesday, March 30, 2011 from 12:00-6:00 PM in the Elementary Office area. This registration is for:

- Incoming PreK students, who must be four by December 1st
- Incoming Kindergarten students who do not attend our PreK program in our elementary building. Incoming Kindergarten candidates must be 5 years old by December 1st.

Students and parents/guardians must be residents of the district. Parents/guardians must provide a valid birth certificate and shot record for their child. Proof of residency or custody may be necessary if there is a question.

PreK registration on this day determines participation. If more than 40 students are registered on this day, all candidates enter a lottery and the first 40 drawn are those chosen to participate. If 40 or less register, all candidates can participate from the start. A waiting list is established if we exceed the maximum of 40 students.

Students currently enrolled in our PreK will bring home paperwork for kindergarten registration, which should be returned to Mrs. McNitt or our office. This begins the process for those students.

All students will be screened in separate sessions, and more information regarding that will follow.

Smartboard Certification Training

A group of 14 teachers recently completed Smartboard certification training at SCCS. These teachers will use the knowledge they gained during the training to help other teachers become more proficient in the use of interactive whiteboard technology (smartboards).

Interactive whiteboards are transforming the way classrooms and boardrooms operate. At first glance they appear to be projections of a computer screen where the user can operate the computer by touching the screen or using a mobile pad. The associated software, however, is capable of so much more. Students are used to "touchable learning" when using a computer screen, cell phone, ipod, etc. and that is what whiteboard technology allows as well. When students or teachers come up to a properly configured interactive whiteboard lesson there is a long list of options that can be put into the lesson. Instead of simply writing notes the lessons can literally come alive.

Interactive whiteboards can provide instant feedback on questions or student responses. Teachers can use them to collect response data, embed sound, video or animation. Links can be generated that will instantly take students to notes, websites, or other sources of information. The possibilities are only limited by the imagination and skill level of the teacher when using the software. There are also large free libraries of lessons already created by other teachers on virtually every topic and subject.

The Sandy Creek Central School District has consistently stated its goal to bring advanced technology to every classroom. Students already have access to computers in every classroom and the installation and implementation of interactive whiteboards adds to the resources available. Creating stimulating, engaging lessons is vital to holding students interest in the classroom. By providing this type of training the SCCS district continues to demonstrate its commitment towards improving the educational environment and opportunities for our students.

New York State Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year. The following pesticide applications took place in the Sandy Creek Central School from September 1, 2010 to February 11, 2011:

There have been no pesticide applications during the above stated period.

As a reminder, the Sandy Creek Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application;
- Anti-microbial products;
- Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Nonvolatile insecticidal baits in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- The application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25;

• The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps, and hornets.

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.

If you have not yet registered to receive 48-hour prior notification of pesticide applications that are scheduled to occur in your school, please complete the form below and return it to Shelley H. SCCS Transportation Department

Our bus drivers train our students on bus safety on a day to day basis. They are also required to conduct Bus Safety Drills three times a year with more in-depth instruction. The most important safety tool for use on the bus is the SAFE CROSSING POSTER created by The New York State Education Department in 1984. Every school bus in the district displays a Safe Crossing Poster, for drivers to go over with students. There are four steps in the poster. They are:

Step #1 ~ "Check before you step" – Students should be looking out the door for passing motorists and a safe space to step before they exit the bus. REASON: Buses are sometimes passed on the right side by inattentive or impatient motorists. If students step off the bus without checking first, they could be hit by a passing motorist.

Step #2 – "I See the Driver, the Driver Sees Me" – Students should be looking at the driver's face while waiting to cross in front of the bus. REASON: If a student can see the driver's face, the driver should, therefore, be able to see the student, which means the child has moved out of the driver's blind spot in front of the bus. No accident report ever indicated the driver could see the child he or she ran over.

Step #3 – "Wait For the Driver's Signal to Cross" – Students cannot see through the school bus when looking back to see if cars are coming. The school bus driver, using all mirrors properly, is in a position to analyze what traffic is doing. It is only when the bus driver is convinced traffic is controlled that the driver gives the child the signal to cross the highway, using proper crossing procedures while doing so.

Step #4 – "Look Left, Right Then Left Again" – Students need to stop and look both ways as they cross in front of the bus. REASON: If students see a passing motorist early enough, they may be less likely to be hit and more likely to retreat to safety if properly taught to do so.

The Pursuit of Energy Savings Initiatives

By Chris Ouderkirk, Superintendent of Buildings & Grounds Just a few short years ago, the Board of Education at SCCS decreed that this school district would expend time and resources to reduce overall energy usage. Since that time, the Facilities Department staff has made that end one of our top priorities. We fully understand that education is a people business and energy reduction is one of the few cost cutting opportunities that does not negatively impact people.



Energy savings opportunities are broken down into three categories: PROJECTS, PROCESS and PROCEDURE. We have completed a number of energy saving PROJECTS over the last few years. These include the addition of two new high efficiency boilers, day-lighting technology, T-5 lighting/occupancy sensors in our gymnasiums, T-8 lighting/occupancy sensors in our media center and an upgraded Energy Management System (EMS).

PROCESS improvements include things that take place during our normal maintenance activities. These can include such actions as replacing failed motors with high-efficiency/properly sized motors, replacing blown incandescent light bulbs with compact fluorescents and anything else that can be improved upon during our normal activities.

PROCEDURE opportunities for energy savings include the energy usage practices of all Sandy Creek school facility users and occupants. Are people turning off lights when leaving an area for more than five minutes? Do doors and windows remain closed during heating and cooling seasons? Are people turning off equipment (including computers) when not in use? Is energy use taken into account when scheduling school activities?

It was recently announced that Sandy Creek Central School, for the second year in a row, has qualified for the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Energy Star Label Award. There are about forty school buildings in Oswego County. Of these, there is only one other building which has ever received this honor. More importantly, it was also announced that there was an energy use reduction at SCCS of 8.7% last year. This is a monetary savings of \$34,655.29. This is significant! We are just getting started!

With the financial situation we find ourselves in here in NYS, it is imperative that all of us be very conscious of our energy use habits. The Board of Education and our maintenance staff will continue to pursue avenues of opportunity to cut energy costs and conserve energy. We ask that everyone associated with the SCCS community do their part and contribute to this effort at every opportunity.

Finally, during this economy, energy efficiency and cost reduction efforts are a top priority all across our nation. Among the things that we have learned during our pursuits in this area, is the great shortage of energy control specialists that exists within the energy management arena.
