## Operation Safe **Stop April 3rd**

On April 3<sup>rd</sup>, the Sandy Creek Transportation Department along with law enforcement personnel from across the state will participate in Operation Safe Stop. At 2:30 p.m. SCCS Department of Transportation Supervisor Robin Cashel will share information, statistics and penalties associated with traffic violations and accidents involving passing a stopped school bus. # Board of Regents revise the Common Core implementation

In February, the Board of Regents approved revisions to the Common Core Standards roll out and its testing program. This controversial program has caused an enormous amount of anxiety and anger from parents, students and educators across New York State. Over the past several months, some very heated public forums have taken place where several Board of Regents members and the Commissioner recieved an ear full.

The Board of Regents did appoint a work group to study the feedback from these forums and make recommendations to improve the roll out.

Nineteen (19) recommendations were presented and adopted by the Board of Regents. Some of the recommendations include:

- Give high school students more time to meet the Common Core Standards.
- Reduce unnecessary tests.



- Eliminate standardized tests for Grades K-2.
- Periodically review and update the Common Core Learning Standards.
- Provide funding to schools for professional development.
- Do not require school districts to use grades 3-8 testing results for promotion or placement of students in certain classes.
- Offer smarter testing options for students with disabilities and English language learners.
- Cap the amount of localized testing time for students.

The above list is only a narrow listing of the changes but some are significant and will have some major impacts on how we plan for the future. The legislative leaders are also discussing changes. I'm sure you will see more changes as this issue continues to get considerable attention in Albany.

# Middle School establishes student leadership group

What if a major event or invention had never occurred in history? How would the world be different today as a result of this not happening? That premise began the 3rd Oswego County Academic Youth (OCAY) League competition and eight teams from schools in Oswego County took the challenge to task.

four to ten students joined together to discover "what if?"

The challenge was the brainchild of coaches Kayley Pilawa from Oswego and Sandra McCullough from Pulaski, and featured four separate tasks. The first task was to create a visual representation of how the world would be different if their historical episode had never happened. To advertise and market their film presentation, the teams had to create a movie poster and write a persuasive essay to support their vision of how life would be impacted had their historical episode not happened. Finally, the students had to complete an MLA style works cited page to accompany their project, documenting their research to support their findings.

The team from Sandy Creek High School proposed to the judges: what if the Industrial Revolution had never occurred? Their thought-provoking question and supporting arguments earned the team a bronze medal in the competition. The team from Hannibal earned gold with their question "what if the printing press was never invented?" and Altmar-Parish-Williamstown took home the silver medal with "what if the colonists had lost the Revolutionary War?"

The OCAY League was organized in the spring of 1997 with the idea that academics merit a standing comparable to athletics. Students' academic skills are challenged and showcased with a particular emphasis on cooperative problem solving. OCAY League is coordinated by Dante Ascenzi through the Oswego County BOCES gifted and talented program.

Individual teams of Oren McDougal and Jordan Trudell took 5<sup>th</sup> place in Shock Value and in Rotor Egg Drop; Makenzie Lococo and Syndey Cook finished 7<sup>th</sup> in Crime Busters; Brianna Snyder and Makenzie Lococo took 9<sup>th</sup> in Rocks and Minerals; and Joe Metott and Sadie Lurcock took 10<sup>th</sup> in Wheeled Vehicles.

The team of 19 students competed in wide variety of science-related competitions with a focus on problem-solving skills and hands-on/minds-on creative learning.

Science Olympiad seeks to make science education more exciting, encourage teamwork and cooperative learning strategies and promote high levels of achievement in science and technology careers.

Coached by science teacher Galen Fellows with assistance from Lyndsey Fellows and Ted Krenrich, the team worked after school and on alternating weekends from September until early March in preparation for the competition.

### **Pesticide Notice**

Dear Parent, Guardian, and School Staff:

New York State Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

The following pesticide applications took place in the Sandy Creek Central School from September 1, 2013 to March 30, 2014:

There have been no pesticide applications during the above stated period.

As a reminder, the Sandy Creek Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application;
- Anti-microbial products;
- Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Nonvolatile insecticidal baits in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- The application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFRI52.25;
- The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps, and hornets.

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.

# Petitions available for a seat on the BOE

The Sandy Creek Central School District is seeking petitions for qualified persons interested in serving on the Sandy Creek Central School District Board of Education. Applicants must be 18 years of age or older and reside within the Sandy Creek Central School District. One seat is up for vote, currently filled by Shannon Akey. The position is a five year seat with the term set to expire on June 30, 2019. Nominating petitions are now available at the District Clerk's office in the District Office Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Completed petitions must be returned to the District Clerk by 4:00 p.m. April 21st to be on the official ballot. Voting for the seat will take place on Tuesday, May 20th between the hours of 12 p.m. and 8 p.m. at the Sandy Creek District Office.

Students in the Sandy Creek Central School District (SCCS) put their literary knowledge to the test as they faced district champions from across Oswego County in the County-wide Battle of the Books contest on March 20<sup>th</sup> at Mexico High School.

Battle of the Books is a nationally recognized literacy program coordinated in Oswego County through the Oswego County BOCES School Library System, and in the Sandy Creek District by Library Media Specialist Rachel Allen. The program encourages students to read, enhances reading comprehension and promotes teamwork as well as academic excellence. Competing students volunteered to participate in Battle of the Books by committing to read 12 to 15 books from a predetermined list. The students, working in teams of two to three members along with a coach, discussed the books and quizzed each other on the contents in preparation for the competition.

Results from the county-wide competition were very close with several contests ending in a tie. The final scores for grades 3-4 resulted in a tie for third place with the teams from Altmar-Parish-Williamstown and Central Square, second place went to the team from Mexico; and first place the team from Oswego. For grades 5-6, again a tie for third place with the teams from Phoenix and Hannibal, second place Oswego, and first place the team from Central Square. In the grades 7-8 competition, third place went to the team from Oswego, with second place determined by a tie breaker question with the final results of second place to the team from Central Square and first place to the team from Phoenix. The 9-12 high school level competition continued the close run with Altmar-Parish-Williamstown and Sandy Creek finishing tied for third place and second place to Phoenix with Central Square at the top spot.

The Battle of the Books began as a statewide reading motivation in Alaska in the early 1980s to encourage and recognize students who enjoy reading, increase reading comprehension, promote academic excellence and broaden reading interests.
